

## From the Chaplain's Desk: All Souls Day

Greetings my brother Knights,

Each year on the second day of November, we celebrate the Feast of All Souls. This follows the Solemnity of All Saints, a celebration of all those who have passed from this life and are enjoying eternal life in heaven. Some of these are recognized officially, that is, "canonized", placed on the official list (canon) of those whom the Church knows are in heaven, while others are certainly in heaven though not known by us. All Souls, on the other hand, are those who have died and are still being purified for the life of heaven. They are in purgatory which the Catechism of the Catholic Church describes as such: "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven". (#1030) On All Souls Day, we pray for these brothers and sisters so that they might be purified of their sins and faults and brought into heavenly glory.

Article 1032 of the Catechism states that this practice can already be found in the Scriptures in the book of Maccabees (2Mac 12:46) and that "from the beginning the Church has honored the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God. The Church also commends almsgiving, indulgences, and works of penance undertaken on behalf of the dead". We can see then the importance of praying for those who have died and whose presence in heaven is not assured. The last quote from the Catechism also indicates other ways we might assist the souls in purgatory: almsgiving, indulgences and works of penance. Have we considered offering alms on behalf of those who have died? In fact, this is practiced even in secular circle in some way when people are asked to make donations to a particular charity or association on behalf of a departed loved one, "in lieu of flowers". We are encouraged to give alms so that the souls undergoing the final purification of purgatory might enjoy eternal life in heaven soon.

The Catechism explains Indulgences (article 1471):

An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minister of redemption, dispenses & applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ & the saints.

These can be offered for both the living and the dead. The requirements for obtaining an indulgence are under the care of the Church since

An indulgence is obtained through the Church who, by virtue of the power of binding and loosing granted her by Christ Jesus, intervenes in favor of individual Christians and opens for them the treasury of the merits of Christ and the saints to obtain from the Father of mercies the remission of the temporal punishments due for their sins. (#1478)

Indulgences can be obtained at various times and in various ways, always involving prayer and some act of charity or penance.

This last is also suggested as a way to pray for the souls in purgatory: works of penance. We deny ourselves something in this life so that the souls might merit from them and be brought into heaven. "Offering it up" is the common expression used. What a wonderful way to demonstrate my love and care for a loved one who has died, by sacrificing my own comfort and pleasure so that they might enjoy eternal bliss in heaven. May God guide us in our prayers and actions for all souls this month.

St. Joseph, patron of the dying, pray for us.

### A Word from Our Worthy Fraternal Insurance Agent *Dave Moeller*

#### Brother Knights,

November is National Long-Term Care Awareness Month, an event recognized by the US legislature as a very important way to raise awareness about elder care and planning before it's needed. To mark the occasion, here are 10 critical facts shared by the American Association for Long-Term Care Insurance:

**# 1** - Americans are living longer, in large part due to advances in medical care and public health. Life expectancy in the US for those reaching 65 was an additional 20 years on average in 2019.

**# 2** - By 2030, one in five residents in the US will be age 65 or older.

**#3** – The number of people in need of long-term support services (LTSS) in the United States is already at 14 million and expected to grow to 27 million by 2050.

**#4** – Average out-of-pocket costs are \$140,000 for those individuals who utilize paid long term support services (LTSS). Roughly 17 percent will spend over \$100,000 on LTSS. Almost 9 percent will spend over \$250,000 on LTSS.

**# 5** – By 2040, the total prevalence of Alzheimer's disease and related dementias in the US is expected to approximately double from 7.2 million to nearly 13 million, with 8.5 million women and 4.5 million men expected to develop dementia.

**# 6** – For those requiring high levels of LTSS, individuals and families pay 55 percent of long-term care costs out of pocket.

**# 7** – Currently, most older single-person households are female. Women comprised 74 percent of solo households age 80 and over.

**# 8** – Some 7.5 million Americans have some form of long-term care insurance. Two-thirds of all new individual long-term care insurance claims pay for care needed by women.

**#9** – The long-term care insurance industry paid out \$11 billion in benefits to some 310,000 individuals with insurance protection in 2019. The number will increase each year as the current number of policyholders grow older and, as a result, are more likely to begin their claim.

**# 10** – 69.5 percent of new claims start after the policyholder reached age 80. If you live a long life, you are very likely going to need long term care. You'll be very glad you have a policy to pay benefits.

These facts are sobering, and you can see why longterm care support is a significant retirement savings "buster". Your Knights of Columbus benefits includes the solution to this issue in the form of Long-term Care insurance available to both you and your spouse. Please contact me for more details.
