# From the Chaplain's Desk A Year of Grace with St Joseph Marello

Greetings my brother Knights,

May we all enter with full hearts and minds into this Season of Advent to prepare well the way of the Lord Jesus. He comes to us if we are open and humble and recognize our great need for him.

Last month, we began our consideration of the virtues of St. Joseph Marello, in this special year of grace, by considering his humility. If we hope to live fully in the presence of God, humility is the key because by it I know of my need for God and that I am not God. We saw that for Marello this meant not giving into his desire to "do something great for God" and the recognition and honor that came with this great achievement. He called this "ambition" which had nearly derailed is answering God's call to priesthood. He strove to practice humility and leave the honor and glory to God.

In order for this humility to continue to take precedence of place in his life, he needed to practice another virtue which is similar to it: to remain hidden or to live a hidden life. He was inspired in this by the example set by St. Joseph, husband of Mary and Guardian of the Redeemer. He saw in St. Joseph a fulfillment of the aspiration stated by St. Paul in his letter to the Colossians: For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God (Col. 3:3). Paul makes this statement in the context of living life for the things of heaven and not for the things of earth. St. Joseph did this by not seeking to be known for earthly achievements or accomplishments, of which he had very little. Instead, he strove to be faithful to what God asked of him in the ordinary life of everyday. He was called to take care of Mary and Jesus, to provide for them, to watch over them, to ensure that each of them was able to carry out God's will. In this case, of course, that meant ensuring that our salvation and redemption would be made possible! That is quite an order, and one might be tempted to make it known to others who I have in my home and under my care! This St. Joseph did not do. And it was a good thing too, because when Herod was seeking to find the newborn king of the Jews to have him killed, he was not able to find him in part because Joseph was not going around bragging about having the Redeemer in his home!

This hidden life lived by St. Joseph of Nazareth and emulated by St. Joseph Marello is not the same as hiding or being secretive. This type of behavior can be detrimental to my good and the good of others. It is not a matter of keeping things hidden that I would not rather have made known. Instead, it is living for God and for God's Kingdom and allowing all recognition and honor to fall where it deserves to fall: to God! When St. Joseph Marello founded the Oblates of St. Joseph, for instance, he did not go around letting everybody know what he had done. On the other hand, when a new bishop came to the Diocese of Asti, where the Congregation was established, he let the new bishop know of their existence and that he was responsible for them. However, so well did he live a life hidden with Christ in God, that when the bishop wanted to know more about the Oblates, he was not sure exactly who their superior was! When he inquired of Fr. Cortona, the first Oblate priest, who his superior was, Fr. Cortona answered that it was he himself, the bishop...a very diplomatic answer! Eventually, he revealed that it was in fact Marello...who was standing right there! Imagine the desire to remain hidden and humble that Marello had to not have spoken up himself to the bishop.

Later, just before he was named Bishop of Acqui. Marello went to live with the Oblates in their first home, Santa Chiara, not far from the seminary where he had been residing. Many of the clergy in the diocese were surprised at this move because living in the seminary was closer to the hub of the diocese and was one more likely to attract attention and to move up the hierarchy. Instead, these same clergy stated, Marello had gone "to bury himself amid the orphans and the infirm" of Santa Chiara. This was true since the Oblates were in the structure with the residents of the former Cerrato hospice and had begun an orphanage not long after taking up residence. Notwithstanding this move to remain even more hidden from honors and recognition (or perhaps because of it!), Marello was soon called to the episcopate as we saw last month. God will give the honor if we do not seek it so much as humbly seek to do his holy Will.

May we also strive to live a life hidden with Christ in God.

### Mount Saint Joseph Wines & St Joseph Marello: What's the Connection?



While visiting the Mount Saint Joseph Seminary, a couple of Saint Joseph Marello parishioners (& Knights of Columbus) were admiring the grounds, & conversations led to a discussion of vineyards. A small group of Saint Joseph Marello parish supporters met with the Oblates of Saint Joseph in 2015 to offer a wine venture partnership. The meeting went very well, and *Mount Saint Joseph Wines* was born. This identification and intertwined connection with the Catholic community, particularly with the Oblates of Saint Joseph and St Joseph Marello Catholic Parish, creates an aspect which sets us apart in our business plan. While Mount Saint Joseph Wines is a "for-profit" organization, proceeds also support the Oblates' seminary and youth ministries.

The Mount Saint Joseph Wines Tasting Room in Granite Bay offers the community a chance to enjoy these wines while supporting the mission of the Oblates. Much of the work of running the tasting room, making the wine, hosting events, and marketing the wine is done by volunteers. The paid staff is small. Many of our volunteers consider Mount Saint Joseph Wines another ministry of St Joseph Marello Parish, like the Knights of Columbus in that we do not fall under the pastor or the parish hierarchy, but we are intertwined with the various work done by the parish, supporting most events, when appropriate. There are very few Catholic wineries in the United States. We are one of the very few. Our tasting room is open Thursday through Sunday. Hours vary; Thursdays from 4 to 7 PM, Fridays from 4 to 8 PM, Saturdays noon to 8 PM, and Sunday's noon to 3 PM. Please come taste our extraordinary wines made from the fruit of the vines and the work of ordinary human hands. Explore our "ministry" of winemaking and supporting our local Catholic community!


