Grand Knight's Report



### From the Chaplain's Desk: OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE: PATRONESS OF THE AMERICAS

Greetings my brother Knights,

We are entering another season of Advent and so preparing to celebrate the birth of the Savior at Christmas. This year we are celebrating our Knights Christmas party on December 12, which is the Solemnity of Our Lady of Guadalupe. As stated above, one of her titles is Patroness of the Americas. This is because the Church recognizes that the appearance of Our Lady to St. Juan Diego marked a turning point in the evangelization of the Americas and so the establishing of the Church in this part of the world. Knowing more about Our Lady of Guadalupe can make this more apparent.

Our Lady appeared to Juan Diego at a time when the Church, through the efforts most especially of priests from Spain, was seeking to bring the Gospel to the natives of what is presently Mexico. Of course, those efforts extended into the present US as well, and even here to California. Up in what is now Canada, the Jesuits from France were seeking to do the same. These efforts were certainly well intentioned and holy and yet the results at first were not every encouraging. Particularly in the place where La Morenita, as she is referred to affectionately in Spanish, decided to appear the local bishop and clergy were having a difficult time. . Some of this was caused by the misbehavior of some of the Spanish "conquistadores" and some by the natives not wishing to leave behind their beliefs and culture for this new "god" of their conquerors. In this situation, the Mother of God appeared to a humble and poor convert, Juan Diego, and put into motion what has been described as the greatest conversion in the history of the Church.

Our Lady asked Juan to go to the bishop and have a chapel built on the hill, Tepeyac, where she was appearing to him. She wanted to let the natives know that she was their mother to and she so presented herself to St. Juan Diego, at one point assuring him, "Am I not your mother who is speaking to you?" The bishop is not sure of the veracity of what Juan is telling him and seeks a sign. Our Lady, in response, tells Juan to pick some roses on Tepeyac, roses which were not native to Mexico but instead to Spain and especially known to the bishop. However, the roses were not the main sign that Our Lady chose to give but instead left her image on the "tilma" (cloak) in which Juan had wrapped the roses. It is this image which led to the conversion of so many people, accompanied by the witness of St. Juan Diego, who spent the rest of his life relating what had happened and how La Morenita has appeared to him and her love for all of them.

I am sure you have all seen the image, or at least representations of it, and know that in it Our Lady appears as one of the Natives, both in her skin tone and in the clothing she wears and the signs that surround her. Each of the items in the image was from the beliefs and cultures of the Natives and helped them to understand that they were not being asked to abandon all of their beliefs but only to see many of them in the light of the birth of the Savior, Jesus Christ. In the image, Our Lady is with child and is ready to give birth to the Redeemer. Her head is bowed, and her eyes cast downward to show that she is not a goddess but is worshipping the true God, who has chosen her to bring his Son Jesus into the world for its salvation. I am not able to explain all of the symbols but the most important is this, which we spend the Advent season preparing to celebrate. As for the Natives of that time, so for us, Mary wants us to know that she is the Mother of the Savior and that he wishes to be born and to live in the life of each and every one of us and of each human being.

May Our Lady of Guadalupe, along with her Spouse, St. Joseph, intercede for all of us.
